Clues:

- 1. This park has many thermal features: geysers (erupt), hot springs (hot pools that do not erupt), mud pots (bubbling mud), and fumaroles (steam).
- 2. This park has more geysers than the rest of the world combines. What you need for a geyser is water, a heat source, natural plumbing system, and porous rock.



- 3. In hot springs, the color of algae can tell you the temperature of the water. Hot water will have yellow and orange colors, while cold water will have dark green colors.
- 4. The park experiences heavy snowfall in the winter.
